

Checklist for Islamic Divorce in South Africa

	Understand Types of Islamic Divorce:
	Familiarize yourself with Talaq (husband-initiated divorce)
	Learn about Faskh (judicial divorce)
	Understand khula' (wife-initiated divorce with compensation)
	Know the difference between revocable and irrevocable divorces.
	Initiate Divorce Proceedings:
	For Talaq: Ensure husband pronounces divorce in a clear, unambiguous manner
	For Faskh: File an application with a recognized ulema body or Islamic scholar
	For Khula': Negotiate terms with spouse or through an ulema body.
	Understand Grounds for Faskh:
	Familiarize yourself with valid grounds for judicial divorce
	Gather evidence to support your case if seeking Faskh.
	Observe Iddah (Waiting Period):
	Understand the duration of Iddah based on your situation
	Know your rights and responsibilities during Iddah
	Determine if reconciliation is possible during this period
	Understand restrictions on remarriage during Iddah
	Know your rights regarding accommodation during Iddah



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Financial Considerations:
Claim any unpaid or deferred mahr (dower)
Understand your right to maintenance during Iddah
Consider claiming arrear maintenance (up to 3 years in SA law)
Discuss division of assets based on Islamic and SA law.
Child Custody and Maintenance:
Understand Islamic principles of child custody (hadhanah) but very importantly know that the South African law principle of the "best interest of the child" has to govern all decision regarding minor children
Discuss and try to agree on child maintenance contributions by each parent.
Legal Documentation:
Obtain a Talāq certificate from an ulema body
Consider obtaining a civil divorce even if you do not have a civil marriage.
Seek Professional Help:
Consult with an Islamic scholar familiar with South African law
Consider engaging a family law attorney
Seek mediation services if available

Address Specific Islamic Divorce Issues:

Decide if you will claim arrears maintenance.

Consider South African Legal Context:

Understand the concept of mu'tah (consolatory gift)

Know your rights under the Divorce Act and the Divorce Amendment Act of 2024

Make sure you have an original copy of your marriage certificate



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Seek counselling or support groups
Engage in spiritual practices for emotional healing.
Future Planning:
Update your will and beneficiary designations
Consider implications on future marriages (e.g., after triple Talāq).
Document Everything:
Keep records of all communications regarding the divorce
Maintain copies of all legal and religious documents
Navigate Polygynous Marriages:
Understand how divorce affects co-wives and their children
Consider implications on inheritance and asset division
Address Potential Complications:
Understand implications of pregnancy on divorce proceedings
Know how to handle disputes about the occurrence or validity of divorce.
